Earlier this year the Phantom Gallery Chicago Network and Big Bang Banners announced a call for artists and designers uniquely and in collaboration to "ante up" their creative currency to generate handmade yard signs that lift up our voices in our community's visual landscape with a message of "Civility, Cooperation, Encouragement and Peace." This project culminates in site-specific installations of posters and images-projected into neighborhood spaces.

On October 13, a "Creative Currency: Words To Live By" project happens at a Phantom Gallery Chicago Network Space in Chicago's Logan Square neighborhood.
